ALPHA IOTA MINUTES May 3, 2014

The Alpha Iota chapter of DKG/PSI state met at 10:00 am at the Georgia State Archives in Morrow for a tour of the archives and its functions. The group's tour was led by Kayla Barrett, Assistant Director for Archival Services. We learned this is the four state archives for Georgia. The first state archives was in the state capital building. In 1918 Rhodes Hall on Peachtree Street held the archives until 1965 when the "Ice Cube" building held the archives until cracks discovered in the building's foundation caused the archives to be located to the one presently holding the state archives. There is a conservator on staff since May 2013. When you register at the archives, your registration is good for five years. Pens are not allowed in the archives-only pencils, flash drives, no flash on cameras and cell phones must be on vibrate.

Kayla took us to various areas inside the archives including a library area. There many historical books are kept for research. There is even a card catalogue with names of historical importance are kept (Laura Michelle found one of her ancestors listed in one of the catalogues). Kayla also took us to the room where items coming into the archives must be cleaned and checked for mold or insects before going into the archives. The tour took more than an hour when the group realized we needed to get to our meeting area. We thanked Kayla and left for the parking area and proceeded to Morrow Methodist Church for lunch and our regular meeting.

Upon arrival at the church Anita Thomaston, AI president, led us in our inspiration – a poem entitled "Tell the Children". Then after giving a blessing, we ate a wonderful lunch prepared by Blondine's.

The next item on the agenda was the installation of officers for 2014-2016 biennium. Anita led in the installing: Laura Michelle Woods as president, Cheryl Goff and Deborah Bhanijirow as co-vice presidents, Kathy Acree, recording secretary, Debra Anderson, treasurer, Anita Thomaston as corresponding secretary, and Bonnie Strohm continuing as parliamentarian with the previous officers from the 2012 – 2014 biennium participating with their respective counterparts.
