


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Cindy Thompson, Martha Tolcher and Cheryl Goff are working as the Literacy Project Committee.



Plans for the Deltahostel are going well. The deadline was pushed back to Saturday, February 24th, so there's still time to register.



Cheryl Goff attended the Leadership Institute, in Macon, on Saturday, February 3rd. "It was the best Leadership Institute I have attended. It was not another workshop for developing leadership and identifying your strengths and weaknesses. Nita Scott, the new International Director, led a wonderful discussion and presented very useful information." Cheryl Goff

Nita shared a personal story about her membership pin and asked us to look at our traditions and their purpose. She asked that we be open to change. There will be hundreds of proposed amendments to the constitution. They will be sent in your next DKG newsletter and voted on at the International Conference in July.

Some major changes Nita shared:

- Collegiate membership options
- Membership on payment vs. Initiation
- Initiation vs. Induction (professional vs. sorority)
- \$10 initiation fee (\$7.50 chapter, \$3.50 state)
- Regional Conferences scheduling, state leadership training, shall vs. may so that change can occur)
- Voting state president vs. every member (possibly electronic)
- Name change Women Educators International was proposed



Nita Scott presented membership data:

- Peak in 1991 with 168,000 members
- Currently 69,000 members

Why do members drop?

- Most common answer is family or professional obligations
- Largest age group 56- 65 years old
- Most would come back if asked at a later date
- 10% by death

Despite all the benefits of membership, what keeps members? Fellowship


Younger members want the opportunity to:

- Make a Difference


Why membership is being heavily stressed:

In order to continue to provide quality programming and leadership opportunities, we need to increase membership.




Nita Scott gave a preview of the new International website. The public site and the member site look very different.

Martha took leadership at the December meeting by sitting next to me to provide comfort. (My dog had passed that morning.) And not just sitting next to me, but sitting **really close**, to the point I felt physically supported. That's also an action of leadership.

We were all chosen to be in this organization because we are leaders. When I was nominated, I'm sure someone saw the *potential* for leadership. It took a long time for me to feel comfortable taking a leadership role for many reasons. But, I'm glad I did, because I have grown a lot in the last several years. Passion overtook fear and as president of our chapter I've been able to work on projects that I am passionate about, such as literacy. One of the driving forces behind my desire to organize the Deltahostel, which was *way* out of my comfort zone, was to combat all the negative publicity about Clayton County.

We need to take leadership for our chapter's culture and ultimately the chapter's future. I have heard members who have held office in our chapter say, "I have done my time." We need our officers to say, "I enjoyed working with the ladies of my chapter. What's next?"
