## **Program**

Maureen Keillor introduced Sue Verhoef, Director of Oral History and Genealogy at the Atlanta History Center. She works in the archives and is in charge of many projects/exhibits. She also presents on-line seminars on genealogy. She received an Emmy in 2014 for a special program, 37 Weeks, shown on GPB. These 90 minute programs tell the story of William T. Sherman's march through Georgia in 1864 and its impact on the outcome of the civil war/1864 election. They are available free on Georgia Public Broadcasting's website.

Sue talked about resources that can be provided by the AHC. Normally, thousands of students tour the museum yearly. This year they received a grant to help develop materials for teachers and students. There are on-line exhibitions including More than Self: Living the Vietnam War. The Kenan Research Center is great for primary sources-archival content is available currently. Terminus is the on-line "card catalog". You may search oral histories, documents, photographs, veteran interviews, etc.

When you click on the For Schools tab, you will find information on on-line tours, characters coming to the classroom, traveling trunks (artifacts related to an historical period) and many other resources. Sue is happy to help teachers with materials for use in their classrooms or to help students with their studies. AHC has a YouTube channel with a selection of author programs and other resources. Every September there is an educator open house, but that couldn't be done this year, so a video was made for this.

The Cyclorama has been moved to the AHC from Grant Park. It can be explored on-line. It was originally commissioned by people in Wisconsin and painted by German painters. It traveled the country as an exhibit. Sections of the painting were cut off because it was too small for the Grant Park building. It has been completely restored and is now displayed properly at the new building at the AHC. There is an app you can use with viewing in person to tell more information about the painting. Contact her if you'd like to visit. Kathy Acree asked if there was a soldier who looks like Clark Gable, and Sue confirmed this. She also recommends the Black Citizenship in the Age of Jim Crow exhibit. At our last virtual meeting, I promised to share some websites for "virtual" exercise classes. Here are some that I do. Of course, anyone with any medical conditions should ask their doctor first.

You might find these too easy, but I REALLY like the exercises at <a href="www.seniorplanet.org">www.seniorplanet.org</a> They are all free via Zoom.

The more aerobic are the Monday/Wednesday, 12:30-1:30, "Fit Fusion." I use the 5 lb handweights which pushes my limit. I greatly enjoy the weekday stretch classes at 10 a.m.-10:30 and on Tues & Thurs 4-4:30. The teacher is CAS. He an outstanding teacher. You need a sturdy chair for the chair ones. He also has a youtube channel, but I wouldn't advise doing those before you do his live classes. He also teaches Yang 10 Tai chi on Fridays at 12:30. Tina Wang teaches chair yoga on Tues & Thurs, 12:30-1:30.

For Senior Planet classes, go to website, then click on join us online, then "upcoming events" in drop down box. Pick class you want and scroll down to bottom of description for zoom link. CAS now has over 340 people from across the U.S. (he's in NYC) taking the stretch classes. He always ends with guided meditation too. I also do some of the classes listed on the Clayton County Seniors They are pre-recorded.

Today someone recommended these to me, but I've never tried them: Paul Eugene Exercises

I daily do Qi Gong or Tai Chi Body Tapping. I started with this book: 5-Minute Chi Boost – Five Pressure Points for Reviving Life Energy and Healing Fast (Chi Powers for Modern Age Volume 1). He has Youtube videos too. I do these and dry brushing first thing each morning.

# \*Update on Supporting Early Educators Project:

From Cheryl Goff: When contacted Clayton State about awarding a second GACE grant some time ago, I got no response. Today I contacted Lynn, the administrative assistant who collected the applications for us, about supporting students. She forwarded my email and I received a response on November 11<sup>th</sup>. Dennis Attick, the Assistant Dean of the School of Education, stated that he would discuss our offer of mentoring and a GACE grant with the various programs and get back to me in the near future.

Here are details for the project we discussed Saturday to support new teachers:

- Please help us identify early educators that our chapter can support with encouraging notes and letters by US Mail.
- Inform the teachers of the purpose of our project and ask for their home or school address.
- Send the teacher names, school, grade, subject area, and mailing addresses to Cheryl.
- The teacher's name, school, grade, and subject area will be collected in a Google document, so that AI members can sign up to support someone in their area of expertise.
- Mailing addresses will be distributed when members sign up for a teacher.
- When writing to the educator:
  - introduce yourself, including your background in education
  - o introduce them to DKG and the purpose of our project
  - o include short inspirational messages, quotes, or stories
  - send funny or inspiring stories from your teaching experience
  - o ask what you can do to assist
