Ms. Black invited us to sign up to receive her blog through e-mail. She also shared a guide to healthy grocery shopping on **Constantly Varied Nutrition.com**. She talked about how we navigate our society where food is constantly used as a reward. She suggested looking at ingredient labels more than calories or fat. Take in the best quality food available, which is whole, real food. If it has five or more ingredients, you may not want to eat it. Avoid chemical preservatives. Dietary fat and protein are essential to health. Fat is a building block of myelin, which coats our nerves and hormones such as estrogen and progesterone. Carbohydrates are still needed. Our diets must start with a basis of fruits and vegetables, nuts and seeds. The vitamins, minerals and fiber they contain are vital for health. They help detoxify our bodies from chemicals in our environment (exhaust, hair dye, expo markers, microwaving food in plastic, etc.). You can be healthy at any size. The simple guideline is to eat real, whole foods 80% of the time and 20% allow yourself to eat other things. We need to live a healthy balance.
